


Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural Policy: St Andrew's Primary School

All we do as a community at St Andrew's is supported by our vision and ethos, much of which is outlined in our Vision blueprint:



We believe in growing together within a Christian community to unlock potential through a curriculum where pupils thrive and develop character.

As a church school, our ethos of 'growing together' is underpinned by the parable of the mustard seed. Through nurturing and care, we believe that from the day our children arrive at our school, they grow spiritually to be the very best versions of themselves. We, in partnership with their families and St Andrew's Church, will enable them to grow into strong, mindful young people with an inner confidence, who have the courage and interest to support others and the world around them.

Jesus told them the parable:

The kingdom of heaven is like this. A man takes a mustard seed and sows it in his field. It is the smallest of all seeds but when it grows up, it is the biggest of all plants. It becomes a tree so that birds come and make their nests in its branches.



This artwork, as well as the story behind it is shared by all the children in our community at least once during the year, offering the chance for them to explore its meaning to them and how it plays out in day to day life at St Andrew's.

As well as this Christian ethos and vision, our curriculum is underpinned by four golden threads of our curriculum intent. Across all life and learning at St Andrew's we seek to develop and explore knowledge and understanding of these four concepts:

- Legacy
- Courage
- Struggle
- Diversity

These are by their very nature intertwined with the spiritual, moral, social and emotional aspects of learning and development, as well as learning about British Values and our approaches to behaviour and emotional development using the Thrive approach in our school.

Our school prides itself in creating an environment within which all children can grow and flourish, respect others and be respected whilst developing self-understanding and appreciation; accommodating difference and respecting the integrity of individuals.

Our aims for SMSC at St Andrew's:

Spiritual Development:

Spirituality at St Andrew's encompasses all we do to offer children ways to grow outside of the academic and concrete elements of learning and development. This quote summarises well what spiritual development means to us.

Spiritual development is the development of an awareness that there is "something more to life than meets the eye, something more than the material, something more than the obvious,

something to wonder at, something to respond to." (Terence Copley)

- ability to be reflective about their own and others' religious or nonreligious beliefs with interest in and respect for different people's feelings, values and faiths.
- sense of enjoyment and fascination in learning about themselves, others and the world around them, including the intangible
- use of imagination and creativity in their learning
- an understanding of the way in which spiritual development and strategies can support their physical and mental health and well-being
- appreciation and understanding of the British Value of 'liberty' the freedom of others to believe and express themselves as they wish

Moral Development:

- ability to recognise the difference between right and wrong, and their readiness to apply this understanding in their own lives.
- acceptance and engagement with the fundamental British Values and respect for the civil and criminal law of England.
- understanding of the consequences of their behaviour and ability to hold restorative conversations, take responsibility for their actions and be forgiving towards others
- knowledge of the different types and representations of bullying and what can be done to stop it
- interest in investigating, and offering reasoned views about, moral and ethical issues. Be able to accept, respect and appreciate that others may have a different viewpoint as explored and taught in the British Value of 'tolerance and respect'

Social Development:

- use of a range of social skills in different contexts, with pupils of all ages and backgrounds
- willingness to participate in a variety of social settings, cooperating well with others and being able to resolve conflicts effectively
- willingness to volunteer and a demonstration of courageous advocacy in local and global settings
- engagement in and understanding of democratic systems and processes, as signified in the British Values curriculum.

Cultural Development:

- understanding and appreciation of the wide range of cultural influences that have shaped their own heritage and that of others
- willingness to participate in, and respond to, for example, artistic, musical, sporting, mathematical, technological, scientific and cultural opportunities

- understanding and appreciation of the wide range of different cultures within school, in the local area and further afield as an essential element of their preparation for life in modern Britain
- interest in exploring, understanding of, and respect for cultural diversity and the extent to which they understand, accept, respect and celebrate diversity, as shown by their attitudes towards different religious, ethnic and socio-economic groups in the local, national and global communities
